This month we focus on our newest branch of the Armed Forces, the **U.S. Space Force** which is quickly growing in our area. Susie Dabrowski and I were honored to attend a recent dinner briefing at the TIDES Club which specifically focused on the Space Training & Readiness Command (**STARCOM**) commanded by Major General Timothy Sejba. Here is a short summary of the Space Force commands in our local area:

<u>STARCOM</u> - Its overall mission is to prepare the Space Force to prevail over our adversaries in

competition and conflict through innovative education, training, doctrine and test. A major command headed up by a two-star general.

SPACE DELTA 10 - A "Delta" is very similar to a "Wing" in the Air Force. Space Delta 10's overall mission is to develop Space Force doctrine and tactics while executing wargames and lessons learned in the process.

<u>SPACE LAUNCH DELTA 45</u> - Formerly known as Patrick Air Force Base, its primary mission is to ensure the safe and successful launch of both U.S. government and commercial payloads into orbit. It includes the base operations functions as well as Cape Canaveral Space Force Station.

Space Force members are known as "Guardians" similar to how members of the U.S. Army are called Soldiers, and members of the Air Force are called Airmen. The title of guardian traces its heritage to Air Force Space Command's motto "Guardians of the High Frontier".

The Space Force Association (<u>www.ussfa.org</u>) is the professional organization keeping us informed of all the latest news and developments in this important warfighting domain. Susie Dabrowski is our MOAACC point of contact for more information.

Reconciliation Review

As the Reconciliation process continues in the Congress, and more specifically in the House, a quick review of the process in the context of the overall fiscal situation is warranted. Reconciliation is a tight-wire act in which the Congress avoids the Senate filibuster threat while threading the needle between a Joint budget resolution (a Total Amount target with "sub-targets" which were passed in early April) and subsequent Committees' efforts to meet those targets across multiple appropriations (i.e. programs). But there are several other restrictions that apply. First, it can only be used to pass provisions that directly affect federal spending, revenues, or the debt limit (this means discretionary spending remains subject to the annual appropriations process). Second, no permanent changes (new law) for issues like concurrent receipt, for example, can be made through this process. Reconciliation is basically the current Congress's opportunity to address the previous Congress's budget, hence the name reconciliation. As of today, the proposed Defense budget sits at about \$1 Trillion, an increase of \$150 Billion over last year, with several "bumps" to programs advocated by MOAA. Time will tell what gets passed.

Late last month, I attended a virtual Legislative Affairs update hosted by MOAA. The following highlights some of the key takeaways. The "Political Environment" was characterized as polarized in the Congress, with the deficit, debt, and inflation as burgeoning issues. Housing and food insecurity, elections and other social issues are also mentioned as contentious. Next, a comparison of "where federal money goes" with snapshots from 1966 and 2024 was offered. In 1966, discretionary spending consumed 70% of the federal budget, with the corresponding 30% consumed by mandatory spending (Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, etc. In 2024, the reverse is true mandatory spending sits at 74% while discretionary spending sits at 26%. Looking at "discretionary spending" in FY 2024, 47% was spent on Defense and 53% on Non-Defense. In the "mandatory spending" realm in FY 2024 programs, Social Security took 34%, Medicare 22%, Medicaid 15%, Income Security 9%, Military/Civilian retirement 5%, and Other 15%. The upshot is that while the pie for mandatory spending is growing (74% today), the pie for discretionary spending is shrinking (26%), of which almost half is dedicated to Defense. The squeeze is on, and Congress is beginning, with President Trump's support, to address it responsibly.

The "DoD Environment" was described as tenuous with the observation that for the past 28 years, the Fiscal Year has begun either under a Continuing Resolution (CR) or a government shutdown, both of which generate uncertainty and put unnecessary handcuffs on military spending. This fragile situation is exacerbated by flat budgets and unpredictable funding, rising rates of global threats and regional conflicts, recruiting challenges, impacts to the military healthcare system, sexual assault and suicide rates, diminished quality of life for servicemember and family housing, and an appetite to reduce personnel and retiree earned benefits. Even though it consumes almost half of the discretionary spending, Defense Spending is currently about 2.4% of GDP, well below its historical (1975-2024) average of 4.2% of GDP. Finally, when looking at "personnel costs as a percentage of the DoD budget", the current figures show personnel costs at 22% of the DoD budget and healthcare at 7% of the DoD budget. The remaining 71% goes to operations, maintenance, equipment, ammunition and the rest.

MOAA concludes by noting that in the 119th Congress, only 19% members of have some military experience. Exactly 100 Members—82 in the House and 18 in the Senate, down from about 61% in 1983. With this understanding of the overall situation in the Congress and the Nation and the world, MOAA, one of the Hill's Top Lobbyists 18 years in a row, stands ready to protect and defend all ranks of all eight uniformed services, especially when their earned pay and benefits are threatened. It is a proud legacy and one that we in the Cape Canaveral Chapter take seriously.

June is Alzheimer's & Brain Awareness Month

Is Alzheimer preventable? We do not know that as of yet but there is extensive research in progress to study just that.

Per the Alzheimer Association, research is still evolving, but evidence is strong that people can reduce their risk by making key lifestyle changes. Based on this research, the Alzheimer's Association offers following 10 Healthy Habits for your Brain:

Challenge your mind: Be curious! Put your brain to work and do something that is new for you. Learn a new skill. Try something artistic. Challenging your mind may have short-and long-term benefits for your brain.

Stay in school: Education reduces the risk of cognitive decline and dementia. Encourage youth to stay in school and pursue the highest level of training possible. Continue your own education by taking a class at a local library or college, or online.

Get moving: Engage in regular exercise. This includes activities that raise your heart rate and increase blood flow to the brain and body. Find ways to build more movement into your day — walking, dancing, gardening — whatever works for you!

Protect your head: Help prevent an injury to your head. Wear a helmet for activities like biking and wear a seatbelt. Protect yourself while playing sports. Do what you can to prevent falls, especially for older adults.

Be smoke-free: Quitting smoking can lower the risk of cognitive decline back to levels similar to those who have not smoked. It's never too late to stop.

Control your blood pressure: Medications can help lower high blood pressure. And healthy habits like eating right and physical activity can help, too. Work with a health care provider to control your blood pressure.

Manage diabetes: Type 2 diabetes can be prevented or controlled by eating healthier, increasing physical activity and taking medication, if necessary.

Eat right: Eating healthier foods can help reduce your risk of cognitive decline. This includes more vegetables and leaner meats/proteins, along with foods that are less processed and lower in fat. Choose healthier meals and snacks that you enjoy and are available to you.

Maintain a healthy weight: Talk to your health care provider about the weight that is healthy for you. Other healthy habits on this list — eating right, exercising and sleeping well — can help with maintaining a healthy weight.

Sleep well: Good quality sleep is important for brain health. Stay off screens before bed and make your sleep

space as comfortable as possible. Do all you can to minimize disruptions. If you have any sleep-related problems, such as sleep apnea, talk to a health care provider.

Take charge of your brain health today — it's never too early or too late to start.

POINTS TO PONDER

This month I continue the series of "Points to Ponder" articles featuring each of the service songs from our military branches. All branches have a "Song," and we've considered three of them in the past months. The Navy has a song, "Anchors Aweigh," but we'll depart from the songs this month. We have the Navy Hymn to consider.

The Navy hymn is interesting in several ways. Most important is, as a hymn, it is a prayer set to music. It is not intended to rouse the hearers/singers to a stirring, martial state of being. Rather, it implores us to consider our place in the world as supplicants to the Almighty.

Eternal Father, strong to save, Whose arm hath bound the restless wave, Who bid'st the mighty ocean deep Its own appointed limits keep; O hear us when we cry to thee, For those in peril on the sea.

Another thing which sets this hymn apart is that it is "owned" by both the US and Royal navies. The lyrics were written in 1861 by a Church of England priest, the Rev. William Whiting. The music was by a British composer of note for many other hymns, the Rev John Dykes.

The hymn was brought to the US Naval Academy in 1879 by the Midshipman Choir director, LtCdr. Charles J. Train. He began the practice of singing the Hymn at each worship service at the Academy.

The other thing to note is the hymn has been adopted by each of the other services By changing the lyrics, and especially the last line of each verse, the hymn is made pertinent to each.

The verses begin differently, of course, but end similarly:

"From every peril on the land."

- "For those in peril in the air."
- "From every peril to the Corp."

"Keep them safe from peril in the deep"

"Bless those who wait for their return."

- "Watch those who guard our coasts."
- "For those who soar through outer space."

"O Father hear us when we pray For those For those we love so far away."

We share so much in our service to this country. We share this prayer as well Amen

A Great Send-Off: The 2025 Military Enlistment Ceremony of the Space Coast

On 15 May nobody played football or soccer at the Viera High School Stadium, but hundreds were there. The event, which began at 6 pm on a warm breezy evening was one of the best community events veterans and others in the community who attended have enjoyed - the First Annual Enlistment Ceremony of the Space Coast.

There were too many to name in person who made this happen. But, to Brevard Public Schools, Viera High School, all Brevard JROTC Units, the event committee, all the recruiters and commanders, the many media reps, local public officials, Rolling Thunder and other riders, MOAACC, DAV and other vet groups in attendance THANK YOU on behalf of the community, the enlistees and their families and friends.



It was a great honor to have BG John Dreska, US Army who is based at the Pentagon, to come down as the keynote speaker as well as several elected local officials who joined Dreska on the stage. They all congratulated the enlistees, much like the "High School Graduation" which happened at Viera in the same place on 23 May 2025.



The greatest sense of appreciation goes to the 152 Enlistees in whose honor we came together. They also represented several hundred others in Brevard and nearby counties, in a record setting recruitment year who could not be there. WHAT AN EVENING!

Here were some observations from attendees:

— One veteran said, "nothing like this happened to me and 95 percent of veterans, when they enlisted". Being honored and launched by the community is huge. Seniors in High School who enlist are usually recognized at their local schools this time of year I personally saw many individual high schools do so at awards ceremonies this year but taking it to this level is another plateau.

— The event committee decided to provide their first military challenge coins to the enlistees. But it was also decided, during the event, to share the coins with the stage dignitaries' team, recruiters, staff and others who helped so much and was rewarding in itself. Seven veterans' organizations a 90 war old WWIL Voteran Mai Coorga Posenfield USA (Pet)

came together to pay for them. One such coin was given to a 99-year-old WWII Veteran Maj George Rosenfield, USA, (Ret).

— Many were worried that the stands seemed sparsely covered at about 5 minutes before the ceremony was to begin (about 350), but all that concern vanished when over 300 JROTC cadets escorted the enlistees into the stadium and filled the football field space.

— From the Constitution Truck at the entrance, to the US Congressional Letter handed out by Keith Van Buren from Rep Haridopolos' office, the oath, the comments by all speakers, and the impact of service to country before self was huge. The perfectly timed fly over by the BCSO Huey Helicopter following the fantastic National Anthem rendition, and the concluding fireworks, took patriotism to a very high level.

The decision to hold this event was made in late February at the suggestion of one of the Army Recruiters based in the Rockledge Office, SGT Joshua Arocho, who was also a member of the event planning team. Arocho had seen a dramatic increase in recruitment numbers for 2024-25 over past years and wondered if this could happen in a short time. Plans are already on the drawing board for 2026 as many want to make this an annual celebration.

The event team included BPS leaders especially School Board Member Matt Susin who also served as MC, BPS Community Relations Officer Yvette Cruz, and members from the veteran, active duty, BPS group created two years ago, the Education and Citizenship Armed Forces Coalition of the Space Coast (ECAC). Special thanks are due to all of them!!

Finally, Thanks to multiple media reps and hundreds of cell phone camera shots which showed up on social media.

Veterans Back to Class: Still working in Brevard County After 10 Years (Aug 2025)

MOAACC and the Veterans Memorial Center (VMC) of Brevard County created a special program in 2015. Ten years later it *has* proven its value in dozens of schools on the Space Coast, in-cluding public, private and homeschooling groups. We call it Brevard Veterans Back to Class (VBC). We have 13 veteran volunteers all over the county. With Covid in 2020-21, VBC filmed 18 veterans covering key topics of value to schools. These tools are available online to all BPS teachers at all times. In 2024 VBC added STEM related programs including several BPS Science Fairs so far.

In 2024-25 twelve VBC volunteers spoke to 4,950 students in 17 schools/programs, sometimes bringing VMC Museum combat era trunks to share. VBC Reps spoke at JROTC Military Balls and other events as well. Teachers also continued to show our 18 video units on topics ranging from the Constitution to WWII to the GWOT. VBC helped spark 13 school fields trips to the VMC Museum and supported four Science Fairs, together involving more than 2000 students. The Education and Citizenship Armed Forces Coalition of the Space Coast (ECAC), formed in August 2024, completed a web site tool re military related education and Museum exploration. ECAC and BPS held a major May 2025 Military Enlistment Ceremony attended by 550 students.

Since 2015 VBC volunteers have presented programs to over 31,200 students at all grade levels.

Our best year still was 2016-17 when our volunteers visited 19 schools including elementary, mid-dle and high schools and talked with 6280 students. We again hope to break that record in 2025-26 since we will again meet with dozens of BPS middle and high school social studies teachers and JROTC Instructors in early August 2025.

— The VBC Program offers links to the teachers who describe their needs for the presentations and allows at least 05 - 10 minutes each class period to the volunteer veteran to tell their story of service and how being a veteran has impacted their lives. Passing on ethos is crucial.

Changes coming in June for Retired Soldiers who pay SBP monthly premiums directly

Some Retired Soldiers need to pay monthly Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) or Reserve Component Survivor Benefit Plan (RCSBP) premiums directly instead of having them deducted from pay because their Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) disability compensation pay offsets their retired pay. We call that direct remittance.

Most of these payments are handled by the U.S. Department of Treasury Centralized Receivables Service (CRS). When CRS receives the payment from the Retired Soldier, they report it to DFAS Retired and Annuitant (R&A) Pay to ensure the retiree's account is credited.

What you need to know

In June of this year, R&A Pay will begin issuing all monthly direct remittance SBP premium billing statements and collecting all SBP premium direct remittance payments instead of using the Treasury's CRS.

This means Retired Soldiers will need to either: (1) make their payments to a different mailing address or (2) change their electronic payments if they have them set up to pay to CRS directly or (3) use Pay.gov at <u>https://www.pay.gov/public/home</u> to pay DFAS.

In March, DFAS mailed a letter explaining the changes to all Retired Soldiers who will be affected. The letter will be followed by an emailed SmartDoc to the retirees who have a valid email address in myPay. Changes like this are one of the reasons it's important for retirees to keep their mailing address and email address updated with DFAS.

What you need to do

It's important that DFAS has your current mailing address so you receive the billing statement with new payment instructions. If your address has changed, DFAS has several convenient options for updating the mailing address on your retired pay account.

1. Use our askDFAS online tool to update your address: find out more on our Quick Tools webpage at <u>https://www.dfas.mil/raquicktools</u>.

2. Send a completed and signed DD Form 2866 to request we update your mailing address.

(A) Upload your signed form as a PDF using our askDFAS online upload tool. Find out more: <u>https://www.dfas.mil/retonlinetools</u>.

(B) Or, mail your form to:

4. Call our Customer Care Center during normal business hours to update your address: (800) 321-1080.

If your mailing address on file with DFAS is current, watch for the updated bill to arrive via postal mail in June 2025 or take action now to change your payment method!

You can make the change to one of the new payment options below to pay DFAS directly right now. You don't have to wait until June.

Automatic payments

If you have an electronic/automatic payment set up with your bank, ensure that you make the change early enough to send your June payment to DFAS instead of CRS.

1. We strongly recommend making your payment online through the Pay.gov website. Pay.gov is available 24/7. 2. If you prefer, mail your SBP/RCSBP payments to the address below (payments mailed to any other address may be delayed). **Please note: beginning October 1, 2025, DFAS is unable to accept checks or money orders as payment.**
