Two Ticking Time Bombs

The House passed its reconciliation package, officially titled the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act" (OBBBA), on 22 May by a vote of 215-214; it now rests with the Senate to compile its own reconciliation bill. The announced goal is to complete the reconciliation process by the 4th of July recess, planned to run from 29 June through 7 July. As the internal discussions and negotiations continue inside the Senate, it is difficult, if not impossible, to predict what might ultimately "be in or out" of the Senate's final version. However, it is probably safe to say the Senate version will be markedly different from what the House passed. On the same note, it is hardly worth addressing what's in the House version and what its impacts might be because it is all destined to change once the two versions are passed and House and Senate negotiations begin to resolve the differences. A special conference committee will be formed, comprised of members from both chambers, who will either negotiate a compromise bill, or simply approve one version or the other. Once they reach that point, a sensible analysis can be made about what the impacts will be, good and bad.

Meanwhile, our Treasury Secretary testified to Congress last month that they should deal with the nation's borrowing limit by mid-July to prevent the federal government from defaulting on its bills, anticipated to occur in August while Congress is again on recess—this time from 4 August to 1 September. He indicated that Congress should either increase the debt limit by a new dollar amount or suspend the current debt limit for a new specified length of time. The national debt sits at \$36.2 Trillion currently and the Treasury Department has been employing "extraordinary measures" since January to avoid default but even these will fail in August. Republican leaders in the House and Senate have included a measure to deal with the debt ceiling time bomb in their respective budget reconciliation packages, but it remains unclear as to when they will become law.

Needless to say, the Congress has its work cut out for it in the near term on these major issues; at the same time, there is more to be done as a follow-up to the passing of the PACT Act in 2022. As we know, this Act, which was prominently supported by MOAA and your own advocacy efforts online, expanded coverage for veterans exposed to the toxic effects of burn pits and other environmental hazards on the battlefield. Specifically, MOAA notes, "it directed new research, required toxic exposure screenings, expanded access to care by the VA, and formally acknowledged several new categories of exposure". However, MOAA asserts, "it did not create the lasting legal structure needed to proactively identify new presumptives and prevent

veterans from facing the same delays experienced by previous generations".

MOAA has proposed "codifying a clear, science-based framework for the presumptive-making process" in three phases with specific timelines and decision points. These phases are:

- Acknowledgement of possible toxic exposure risk
- Concession of exposure to a toxic substance
- Presumption of service connection between exposure and disease(s)

So, while the PACT Act of 2022 was a significant achievement supported by both chambers of Congress on a bipartisan basis, there is more to do. If anything was apparent from watching the Army's 250th Birthday celebration and parade in Washington, DC, on 14 June, it is that our Soldiers (Sailors, Airmen and Marines) are "our crown jewel", to quote General Stanley McChrystal in a recent interview. What more reason could we need to protect, support, and care for them when they go into harm's way on our behalf?

July Is UV Safety Awareness Month



Living in southern/central Florida further makes us prone to excessive sun exposure. Why is that? Well, one of the simplest reasons is that the Brevard county lies between 28° and 29° N Latitude. Why is that important to know?

Specifically, after the summer solstice, the angle of the solar rays is virtually at 90° which from geometry we know is the shortest distance hence the rays are most concentrated. Making us vulnerable to the harmful exposure of the UV rays progressively worsening from sunrise to noon followed by <u>a very gradual</u> increasing angles towards the sunset. As we know the days are longer hance more danger of exposure.

Understanding UV Radiation:

- Ultraviolet (UV) radiation is a form of energy from the sun that can cause skin damage, including sunburn, premature aging, and an increased risk of skin cancer.
- There are three types of UV radiation: UVA, UVB, and UVC.
- UVA rays penetrate the skin and are associated with aging and sun damage.

- UVB rays cause sunburn and can increase the risk of skin cancer.
- UVC rays are mostly absorbed by the atmosphere and are not a significant source of damage to humans.

Protecting Yourself from UV Radiation:

- Seek Shade: During peak hours (10 a.m. 4 p.m.), when UV rays are strongest, find shade from trees, buildings, or umbrellas.
- Wear Protective Clothing: Wear long-sleeved shirts, pants, and a wide-brimmed hat to cover exposed skin.
- Use Sunscreen: Apply a broad-spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher to all exposed skin. Reapply every two hours, or sooner if swimming or sweating.
- Wear Sunglasses: Choose sunglasses that block 99-100% of UVA and UVB rays, especially those with wrap-around frames.
- **Be Mindful of Reflections:** Water, snow, and sand can reflect UV rays, increasing exposure.
- **Consider the UV Index:** Check the UV index for your area to understand the level of UV radiation and take appropriate precautions.

Semper Paratus

We continue our series on our beloved service songs...

The story of the Coast Guard song begins in the winter of 1922 aboard the Cutter Yamacraw. In a moment of creative inspiration, Captain Francis Saltus Van Boskerck crafted a poem recounting the legendary feats of America's coastal guardians. Van Boskerck served from "Aztec shore to Arctic zones" as the poem reflects. He likely battled "surf and storm and howling gales" commanding the famed Cutter Bear during his Bering Sea patrol in 1921.

While stationed at the Alaskan town of Unalaska, Van Boskerck, with the musical assistance of two U.S. Public Health Service dentists, sat down at the piano to compose the musical score to Semper Paratus, "Always Prepared." Van Boskerck's last tour was Captain of the Norfolk Port there *Semper Paratus* made its public debut in 1927 at a meeting of the League of Coast Guard Women.

Van Boskerck presented his composition to the publisher of the Coast Guard magazine, Lt. Col. Harvey Miller, in Washington, D.C. With the help of the U.S. Naval Academy bandmaster, Miller developed a full orchestral presentation and held a gala to formally premiere Semper Paratus. The presentation featured a storm scene with a quartet dressed in lifesaving garb!

There's a touch of irony on the business side of the Coast Guard's anthem: While the initial copyright was held by the Coast Guard, Col. Miller sold it without authorization. The music publisher still owns the rights to the song and charges the Coast Guard a fee every time their band performs it!

The chorus of Semper Paratus proclaims: "We're always ready for the call, We place our trust in Thee. Through surf and storm and howling gale, High shall our purpose be. Semper Paratus is our guide, Our fame, our glory too. To fight to save or fight and die, Aye! Coast Guard we are for you!" By placing "our trust in Thee," the Guard is declaring that they are dependent on the Almighty to see them through to mission accomplishment.

This trust in God to the point of personal sacrifice is reflected in the last words of Semper Paratus: "To sink the foe or save the maimed, Our mission and our pride. We'll carry on 'til Kingdom Come, Ideals for which we've died."

Later assignments included Commander 106th Finance Battalion in Germany, Commander 175th Theater Finance Command in Korea, and Commandant U.S. Army Finance School. His military education included the Infantry Basic, Airborne, & Ranger Courses, CGSC, and the National War College. The following is from an article Jeff shared with our MOAACC chapter in 2019 title "The Korean Experience."

Each year, as the month of June approaches, I find myself reflecting on "The Korean Experience." You may remember that it was the 25th of June in 1950 when the North Korean army invaded the Republic of Korea (South Korea). South Korea was woefully unprepared, as was her ally the United States, in its ability to support the ROK. This is eerily similar to where our nation had been heading recently, but hopefully is now starting to wake up.I served as a commander in the Republic of Korea (ROK) in the early 1990s. Aside from my having served, there is also a special family connection in that both my late father-in-law and my late father fought in Korea -- one on the frontend of the war and the other at the backend thinking of them at this time is

kind of fitting as well since Father's Day is also in June). My father-inlaw (then 1st Lieutenant Carl B. Nerdahl) was an Infantry officer who fought on the frontend. He was one of the very few American officers on the 38th parallel the day of the invasion (25 June 1950) advising the 6th ROK Division which actually performed quite well in spite of the circumstances. Not only was my father-in-law one of a small number of American officers on the parallel that day, but he was one of the very few who in fact survived those days (actually not sure there were any other U.S. officers that far forward who were not killed or captured). My father-in-law went on to fight in Korea for another year (promoted twice) as Eighth Army fell all the way back to the Pusan Perimeter and then returned to north of Seoul following the Inchon Landing. My father (then Captain Harry L. Rogers III) commanded a 200-man rifle company toward the backend of the war. In September 1952 his company successfully conducted an incredibly complex and dangerous operation -- an all- night attack for the capture of a mountain top called Old Baldy, not far from Pork Chop Hill. It was the last American retaking of Old Baldy with his Soldiers showing extraordinary heroism. In fact, three were awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for their valor that night; others were awarded Silver Stars.

So as June approaches and I consider the Korean experience (my own and that of my family), I think about how our nation must stay sufficiently prepared for conflicts that we can't even foresee such as in June 1950. Our great Chapter and MOAA must continue to be a strong voice to effect the requisite readiness our nation needs.

This represents the passing of experience and knowledge from the Old Guard to the young of our Army. 1LT Hemp accepted the ceremonial 1st piece of cake to honor leadership and guidance of all senior and superiors in the chain of command.

As the night closed and we reflect on the history of our Army. We are inspired by numerous men and women that have served and continue to serve. We respect the fact that service to our nation in the Army is the most noble of professions. We, the Soldiers in service to our nation, are part of the Army's great history and legacy. VMC Construction Update:

Half-Way There: Construction of a Crown Jewel on Merritt Island on Track



Six months into the \$8.2 Million Project to build a major Amphitheater and many other upgrades at the Brevard Veterans Memorial Center (BVMC) Park, shows the project ahead of schedule and creating more excitement. Barring hurricane slowdowns this summer and fall, an ahead of schedule grand opening and ribbon cutting for the amazing project could happen on November 11 — Veterans Day this year.

As you may have read in these and other media pages over the past year, this project, approved by the County Commissioners in August 2024, was 7 years in the making and included major grants from the State of Florida, the Tourist Development Council, Brevard County and Brevard Parks and Recreation. The BVMC Park is already one of the best county parks in Brevard and since 2016 has been managed and kept up by the volunteer veterans of BVMC with financial and major maintenance help from Parks and Rec. Once the Amphitheater is completed, Parks and Rec will have a greater role in scheduling major events whose proceeds will in part also help with what will be higher support costs. The BVMC Park has always been a community as well as "veterans" park and has seen thousands of visitors since opening on Veterans Day 2016.

Those using the Park until now include the public from dawn to dusk walking, jogging, fishing, using the playground and adult work out areas, etc. Every year the Park hosts 10 major high school JROTC events and many special events including the Key Lime Pie Festival (3 years); 5K fundraisers; Car Show, Back Brevard Heroes Celebration of First Responders, Merritt Island Grand Illumination in December and many more veteran and community events.

With the amphitheater in place at least by early 2026, all the above will continue and increase, but the BVMC Park will also be the scene of major concerts and other professional events with ticketing as crowds up to 5000 can be accommodated. In the meantime, anticipation is building, and a major media push is underway through the county on the expanded BVMC Park to attract acts and interest upon completion.

June brought some initial good news on that score when the outstanding Space Coast Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Aaron Collins, volunteered to play a full patriotic concert at the ribbon cutting and will start using the new amphitheater as its outdoor home base. That was among the many reasons why the project was first endorsed and partially funded in 2019-20.

The "New BVMC Park" will clearly be a huge asset for Brevard residents, visitors, tourists and veterans of all ages and interests in the months and years ahead.

Email Security: A Guide for Seniors

In today's connected world, email is a vital tool for staying in touch with family, friends, and managing personal matters. However, seniors who are not as familiar with computers may find it challenging to navigate the online landscape safely. The good news is, by following a few simple guidelines, you can keep your email account secure and avoid common threats like scams and identity theft.

- 1. **Recognize Phishing Scams:** Phishing emails are attempts to trick you into sharing personal information, such as passwords or bank account details. Be suspicious of emails that urge you to act quickly or ask for sensitive information. Legitimate businesses never ask for personal details through email.
- 2. Verify the Sender: Before clicking on any links or opening attachments, always double-check the sender's email address. A common tactic used by scammers is to disguise their email address to look like a legitimate one, so be extra cautious with unfamiliar names or addresses that look slightly different from trusted sources.

Women Veterans Day Celebration Rosa Reich, Capt USAF (fmr), 1st VP MOAACC



On June 12, 1948, the Women's Armed Services Integration Act was signed into law by President Harry S. Truman. The act made way for women to serve as military members and making them deserving of full recognition as veterans. An exception to this act was that women were not to serve in combat.

Though women had served in all conflicts, they were not considered as part of the regular military. For example, during WW II, they were to serve for the "duration plus six months."

Gen. Eisenhower told Congress after the war, that when the formation of women's units was first proposed, "I was violently against it." Then he added, "Every phase of the record they compiled during the war convinced me of the error of my first reaction." Eisenhower went on to fight for a permanent place for women in the US Armed Forces.

As of 2020, women veterans make up approximately 9% of the total veteran population in the United States. However, this percentage is projected to increase to 18% by 2040. Recent enlistments have a rate of approximately 20% women joining the military.

The first celebration of Women Veterans Day occurred on the 70th anniversary of the act, June 12, 2018. While it is not yet a federally recognized celebration, we have been celebrated in Brevard County since 2023. Organized by AVET Project, a Brevard County nonprofit that supports veterans, this year's celebration was held at the Holiday Inn Melbourne-Viera Conference Center. Close to 150 women vets attended the lunch. Several MOAACC members were also in attendance, sitting at the MOAACC Good Deed's sponsored table. The toast to the women veterans was delivered by Donn Weaver.

The event was also a chance for camaraderie and learn about services available to veterans. As an attendee to this event the past three years, it has been my honor to meet so many women showing their pride at having served, and thanks to that act in 1948, be recognized as veterans.


