






It's a plane, it's a bird...it's a drone.

## The Richard Star Act: Why It's Still Important to All of Us

The 2024 Florida Council of Chapters (FCoC) Convention in Daytona Beach just concluded (13-15 May 2024) and what follows is hot off the presses. As an aside, the convention was another big success in spite of the lower-than-expected numbers in attendance. The convention is open to all members and most of the 37 chapters in Florida were represented. MOAACC was also well represented and our own past president, Steve Bond, was elected President of the FCoC for the next two years. MOAACC was again recognized as a 5-star chapter by the MOAA President and Chairman of the Board, General (retired) Gary North, who also shared some words of wisdom about the importance of continuing to serve our veteran, retiree and active-duty constituents and their families in every capacity. This continued service is greatly appreciated by all.

Before taking a deep dive into the Richard Star Act, the recent announcement by Congressman Bill Posey (R-FL) of his impending retirement from Congress at the end of the current session in December 2024 is noteworthy. There are five "qualified" candidates to replace him: three Republicans—John Hearton, Joe Babits and Mike Haridopolos; and two Democrats—Sandy Kennedy and Daniel McDow. To qualify as a candidate, a prospective candidate must meet certain criteria and filing deadlines according to the Florida Division of Elections website: https://dos.fl.gov/elections/

The Richard Star Act (H.R. 1282/S. 344) continues to be a top priority of MOAA especially as the 2025 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) is being formulated in committee. As you know, this bill would allow combat-injured veterans to receive their earned retirement pay AND their VA disability compensation without any offset. In a word, this offset is unjustified in light of the unfathomable sacrifice made by the combat-wounded on top of decrementing the earned benefit of retirement pay, even for those whose 20-year career potential was cut short by the injury. In spite of the fact that the Richard Star Act has broad bi-partisan support in both chambers of Congress with 72 Senators (including Senators Rubio and Scott) and 327 Representatives (including Rep. Posey) as co-sponsors, the legislation suffers from several pieces of mis-information.

This mis-information begins with the perception of serious cost concerns promulgated by the Congressional Budget Office which projects a \$9 Billion estimate over ten years, real money in the context of an ever-growing annual deficit and the out-of-control national debt. Several factors ameliorate this estimate. There is a five-year phase-in period which reduces the cost estimate significantly. It also assumes all 52,304 combatinjured veterans covered by the legislation would move out of the tax-free Combat-Related Special Compensation (CRSC) to Concurrent Retirement and Disability Pay (CRDP) without offset. For some, the move would not be advantageous, resulting in no additional cost to the government.

Finally, in the midst of the burgeoning recruiting crisis faced

by the military (all services except for the USMC and with DoD offering huge bonuses to retain certain Naval Aviators for example), it makes no sense to telegraph a message of "your service is being discounted". Rather, the passage of this bill would demonstrate a continued commitment to those who served and endured the additional pain and suffering of being wounded in combat. Anyone considering a career in the Armed Forces of the United States should be encouraged to pursue it with the knowledge that the Nation has their back. And all of us who have served have a sacred duty to push hard for the passage of this restoration of earned benefits and full compensation for wounds received in the line of duty. #### "God is With Us"

We're vulnerable in many ways. Most of us in MOAACC are at an age when diseases, physical limitations, and pure age at times cause difficulties in our lives. Family members and friends are experiencing the same. Some of them, even us, have become permanently disabled. Some of them even died.

I wonder how many of them, or us, have wondered "Why is this happening to me? What did I do to deserve this?" I'm sure we have all seen interviews with family members of people who have died in a shooting or other tragedy. On air they raged, "They didn't deserve this! How could this happen? It is so unjust!" When my daughter, Nicole died, my wife Anita, and I wondered "How could God let this happen?" That thought, for all of us, comes from a place deep within that believes only really bad people deserve bad things. Good things should come to good people -- and I'm good.

Suffering can happen to anyone. We who spent time in the military have seen it. We've even heard of survivor's guilt, "Why them and not me?" Honestly, bad things can happen to anyone. Accidents, illnesses, criminal acts, natural disasters – any of them could happen to any of us at any time.

If bad things happen to good people, the thing gnawing in our guts, the depths of our soul, is the question, "Where is God?" For that question there is always an answer. God is with you! God's tears mingle with our own. We probably don't feel it at the time, but we have God's promise! We can know it, trust it, and count on it always.

Moses led the people of Israel out of Egypt but he never entered the Promised Land. Before he left the people he told them God's promise, "I will never fail you nor forsake you."

God is with <u>us</u> too. Jesus promised his disciples, "I am with you always." And so, he is.

Yes, we're vulnerable. Anything can happen to us at any time. Still, we're never alone. God is with us always to share whatever happens -- anywhere. That's a promise!

#### Stress Testing Your Estate Plan - Part 1

This summer is an appropriate time to stress test our estate plan because **Steadfast Defender 24** (the successor to the Cold War era REFORGER exercises) just ended in May. This exercise tested the readiness of NATO to quickly deploy forces to defend every inch of its territory. It is not a war college tabletop exercise; it is the real movement of over 90K troops from all 32 NATO Allies.

With that mindset, stress testing your estate plan involves the same direct, hands-on activity on our part. It is not a checklist exercise, it is the actual locating, checking, processing and proper restowing of all critical items and information.

In Part 1, we're going to stress test two scenarios. Successfully completing Part 1 prepares us for an even more stressful estate plan stress test (we'll get to that in our, Part 2 article -- we don't want to stress you out too soon).

In most military families, one partner manages the household while the other pursues their military career. With extended periods of separation, there's not much time for cross-training each other on running the household. Even when there is time, there is the natural resistance to relinquishing control over household affairs to someone that could be called away at a moment's notice. And this role relationship often continues after retirement.


Scenario 1: In this scenario, the military member is dead (no time for euphemisms). Benefits are lost that day, notifications must be made within days, arrangements must be made, living adjustments must be executed ... the list goes on and on. That's why we have checklists (the estate plan) and our MOAA Chapter's Survivor Assistance Team (SAT). But life goes on, the standard of living is adjusted to the new income stream. The stressful irritants in this scenario include timely notifications, locating vital documents (DD214, insurance policies, etcetera), and processing the paperwork. Here, the survivor must be able to lay hands on all the critical documents. The SAT helps with the checklist part but only you can locate the documents. To pass this test, locate the key documents. If you can't find them, get them. That's it ... for right now.

**Scenario 2:** The homemaker is dead. The military member is confronted with three major stressors (beyond emotional loss): disruption of the military career, caring for any children, and the need to now manage the household. The member's Service, our MOAACC SAT, and family members on both sides can help. But the major impediment to eventual recovery is finally appreciating all that the homemaker was contributing to support the family and the career. **To pass this test** make sure you know all the facets of running the household and have full access to all household accounts, including account numbers, usernames, passwords.

Both scenarios require action, not simulation. The time is now because no one knows when the time will come. Failing either test has the dubious benefit of shortening the grieving process, with sadness being replaced by anger and recrimination.

Next month, Part 2. Make sure you pass the tests in Part 1 to be ready for what could come next.



#### EAA Chapter 724 Honors Special Veteran and First Responder's Children

On May 11th, 2024, EAA Chapter 724 located at the Merritt Island Airport flew five children of Gold Star (where a service member died during active duty), military and first responder families impacted by career related disabilities. This also includes children whose parent lost their battle with depression.

The Experimental Aircraft Association's (EAA) national program began back in 1992, <a href="https://www.eaa.org/eaa/youth/free-ye-">https://www.eaa.org/eaa/youth/free-ye-</a> <u>flights</u>. This national program originated in Oshkosh, Wisconsin with a goal of introducing one million children to aviation before the 100th anniversary of the Wright Brothers' first flight. EAA achieved that goal and decided to carry the program forward where today, 32 years later, they have given 2.3 million children this free, fully insured introduction to aviation.

Locally, EAA Chapter 724's pilots <a href="https://chapters.eaa.org/eaa724/">https://chapters.eaa.org/eaa724/</a> about-us---officers have flown nearly 8,900 children as part of an introduction to aviation. This May 11th event was the second annual event sponsored by EAA Chapter 724 dedicated to these special children. We believe EAA Chapter 724's specific effort for these particular children is unique in the nation.

These children learned about aircraft safety, avionics and were flown for approximately 30-40 minutes over Merritt Island, Port Canaveral, the Banana River and the Indian River Lagoon. Chapter 724 honors these children with wonderfully positive and safe experiences. May 11th was a beautiful day for each of these children.

Each child received a certificate documenting their flight and a formal Logbook with the date of the flight, pilots' signature and the amount of flying time. When the children are old enough, the national EAA Headquarters offers them free online ground school worth several hundreds of dollars. Lastly, the flights of these children and the other 2.3M children are placed into the EAA's world's largest Logbook, online with their name, date, pilot's name, and the type of plane they flew in, https://www.eaa.org/eaa/youth/freeye-flights/eaa-young-eagles-logbook.

The third annual Young Eagle event for children of specific military and first responder parents is scheduled for February 22, 2025.



CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — The Coast Guard held a heritage recognition ceremony, Thursday, in Cape Canaveral to honor the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Confidence (WMEC 619) and recognize its 58 years of service. The ceremony was presided over by Cmdr. Thomas Martin, commanding officer of Confidence, and served to celebrate the Confidence's contributions to the service and Nation in the presence of cutter leadership, current and former crew members, families, and friends.

The event also marked the ship's exit from active-duty service for an indeterminate time, placing it in commission, special status. The 210-foot Confidence operated as a Coast Guard Atlantic Area command asset, based in Portsmouth, Virginia, and was most recently homeported in Cape Canaveral.

#### The Role of Aircraft in WWI (Part 5)

THE LAFAYETTE ESCADRILLE. Dr. Edmond Gros, an American expatriate living in France in 1915, along with Norman Prince of Boston, Massachusetts, and William Thaw of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania conceived the idea of The Lafayette Escadrille. They lobbied Parisian officials to create an all-American squadron within the French Air Service to aid the Allied cause. The three recognized the need for more combat forces and they were equally aware of the positive propaganda value Americans flying under the French flag would bring to acquire United States support for the Allied cause. French officials approved the concept on August 21st, 1915.

The Lafayette Escadrille, officially designated N.124, was formed eight months later under the command of French Air Service Captain George Thenault. A few of the Americans joining the new squadron previously served in the French Air Service, however, most were beginner aviators having just mastered the most basic elements of flight. Captain George Thenault, now Commanding Officer of the Lafayette Escadrille stated, "Since the formation of the American Escadrille, I have tried to exalt the beauty of the ideal which brought my American comrades to fight for France.

Their first combat patrols saw the new aviator's strain to master their aerial craft amidst a hail of enemy gunfire, nevertheless, these amateur airmen rapidly matured into seasoned veterans. Kiffin Rockwell scored the unit's first victory on May 18, 1916. Operating from austere bases close to the front lines, the airmen took to the sky to secure air superiority during some of the war's largest campaigns, including the Battle of Verdun, the Somme Offensive, the Nivelle Offensive, the Aisne Offensive, and the Ypres-Lys Offensive. The American Flyers escorted Allied bombers as they struck targets deep behind enemy lines as well. Some units experienced casualty rates greater than 400 percent. The

risks associated with daily combat operations were pronounced. Flying amidst such odds yielded a stark understanding regarding dedication to duty and sacrifice.

Stories of the Lafayette Escadrille spread around the globe. These young flyers were perceived to be noble champions of the Allied cause. The Squadron's famous mascot, a lion cub, rescued from a local circus grew into a rather large cat. (Next month: The Role of Aircraft In WWI. Part 6)



# K-9 CORPS Over 4000 military dogs served in Vietnam as Scouts, Sentries, Trackers and Patrol Dogs. Mostly German Shepherds and Labrador Retrievers, they were involved in over 90,000 missions. It has been estimated that their service prevented over 10,000 casualties. They were responsible for finding more than 2000 VC bunkers, secret tunnels and countless booby traps. The K-9 Teams proved so effective that the Viet Cong began placing cash bounties on the dogs and their handlers. Of the 4000 dogs who served in Vietnam, only a handful were returned home. When the war ended, the government refused the handlers pleas to bring the dogs home, and ordered them left behind as "surplus material". In America's haste to GET OUT of Vietnam, we left about 500 with the South Vietnamese and the rest were euthanized. These were very special Soldiers and will always be remembered in the hearts of those who served with them. On Point and Forever Forward: The K-9 Corps
