LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS

Allies and Friends

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky roamed the halls of Congress mid-December in an effort to make the case for continuing US aid to his fight for survival against Russian aggression only to return home empty handed for the time being. His attempts to pry additional aid from the European Union (EU) met with similar rejection given objections from member state Hungary known to be Russia's closest ally in the EU. The EU commitment continues in spite of the reticence of Hungary with an overall contribution (military, humanitarian and economic) exceeding \$80 Billion to date while the US total approaches \$75 Billion, a tandem effort that Zelensky hopes to propagate until Ukraine prevails.

Meanwhile, Israel's ongoing fight to annihilate Hamas in Gaza after the horrendous attack by Hamas on innocent Israeli civilians on 7 October continues unabated in spite of US calls for a more "measured" approach to protect Palestinian civilians and allow more humanitarian aid. The US Congress has generally been unwavering and open-ended in support of the government of Israel. A US sponsored plan for an ultimate two-state solution and a Palestinian Authority security force in Gaza after hostilities end seems to be a non-sequitur in Israel, at least with its Prime Minister Netanyahu.

The sticking point in the US Congress stems from Republicans who want the Biden Administration and Democrats in general to compromise on immigration policies and security on the US-Mexico border, a legitimate demand given the overwhelming numbers of immigrants seeking asylum and other relief from their home countries. As of this writing, Senate Democrats announced a delay in their upcoming holiday break to work on a bipartisan bill which combines military assistance for Ukraine and measures to address the border crisis. Thus, the Congress must consider approval of a \$110.5 billion emergency spending bill that would directs hundreds of millions of dollars toward sending weapons to Ukraine and Israel, bolster US border security, and provide disaster relief funding as well.

An interesting phenomenon is developing in the House with at least 15 Republicans and 25 Democrats deciding to retire from legislative service. There are multiple reasons for these announcements including running for higher or other offices, shifting district boundaries, outright retirement, and being replaced short of finishing the current term such as is the case with George Santos and Kevin McCarthy. These announcements will play large in the 2024 election

cycle as the control of the House is in play again.

Finally, the Congress passed the FY'24 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). The bill authorizes (but does not appropriate, a separate budgeting step) \$886 Billion for Defense after a 310-to-118 House vote reflecting the bipartisan nature of the bill, which followed passage in the Senate by an 87-13 margin. Bicameral negotiators subsequently resolved differences in the legislation thus maintaining Washington's six-decade streak of approving military policy legislation on an annual basis. Better late than never and effective only insofar as the Congress is able to appropriate funds to implement what is authorized to avoid the next possible government shutdown. The authorization still requires appropriated funds from Congress, with deadlines of Jan. 19 and Feb. 2 approaching for the current "laddered" continuing resolutions.

The final 3,000-page conference report on the NDAA authorizes a 5.2% pay increase for service members and civilian employees of the Pentagon (the largest since 2002), provides a variety of measures to improve competition with Russia and China to include an expansion of partnerships in Europe and the Indo-Pacific regions, and the development of hypersonic weapons and upgrades to the nuclear arsenal. Additionally, it allows a submarine deal at the heart of a new security partnership with Britain and Australia, and would extend into 2025 a program that allows the intelligence community to conduct warrantless surveillance of foreign individuals outside the United States. Many of MOAA's priorities were supported in the conference report while others such as the Major Richard Star Act (H.R. 1282 | S. 344) were not. As you know, this legislation would reverse an unjust offset requiring these combat-injured retirees to give up a dollar of DoD-earned retirement pay for every dollar of VA-provided disability benefits they receive. Perhaps there will be an opportunity for inclusion in the next NDAA as we approach a contentious election year.





SURVIVOR ASSISTANCE LESSONS LEARNED

The monthly "Survivor Assistance Lessons Learned" articles are based on actual experiences for what to do or not to do to help get through a tough time. However, when you lose someone just before, during or soon after a Holiday, that can make it even tougher to deal with. So, I thought I would pass on some tips that might help that I found on the websites of some of the caregiving organizations on how to deal with grief at losing someone close to the holiday season.

Set realistic expectations for yourself. Remind yourself that this year is different. Examine the tasks and events of celebrating and ask yourself if you want to continue them. Accept others' offers to cook, shop, decorate, etc. Consider shopping by phone, Internet or catalog this year if you feel a need to avoid crowds or memories.

Surround yourself with people who love and support you. Share your plans with family and friends and let them know of changes in holiday routines. Memories can sometimes be a source of comfort to the bereaved, so share them by telling stories and looking at photo albums.

Despite the temptation, try to avoid "canceling" the holiday. It is OK to avoid some circumstances that you don't feel ready to handle, but don't isolate yourself. Make some time for solitude, remembering and grieving, but balance it with planned social activities.

Allow yourself to feel joy, sadness, anger – allow yourself to grieve. It is important to recognize that every family member has his/her own unique grief experience. No one way is right or wrong. Experiencing joy and laughter during a time of grief does not mean you have forgotten your loved one.

Draw comfort from doing for others. Consider giving a donation or gift in memory of your loved one. Invite a guest who might otherwise be alone for the holidays. Adopt a needy family during the holiday season.

The most important thing to remember is there is no right or wrong way to celebrate the holiday season after the death of a loved one. The best coping mechanism for the first holiday season is to plan ahead, get support from others and take it easy.

CAPT Winston Scott, USN, Astronaut

Luncheon Speaker
WINSTON SCOTT,
USN, ASTRONAUT

"Reflections From Earth Orbit."

Winston Scott is a former NASA astronaut and retired U.S. Navy Captain. Scott entered Naval Aviation Officer Candidate School after graduation from Florida State University in December 1972 and was designated

a Naval Aviator in 1974. He served as a production test pilot flying the F/A-18 Hornet and the A-7 Corsair aircraft. Scott has accumulated more than 5,000 hours of flight time in 20 different military and civilian aircraft, and more than 200 shipboard landings.

Scott was selected by NASA and reported to the Johnson Space Center in 1992. He logged 24 days, 14 hours, and 34 minutes as a mission specialist in space during his two missions STS-72 Endeavour and STS-87 Columbia. Scott performed three spacewalks totaling 19 hours and 26 minutes. STS-72 Endeavour launched January 11, 1996 and retrieved two satellites while in orbit. Scott completed his first spacewalk, or EVA, lasting 6 hours and 53 minutes. His goal was to evaluate techniques utilized in the assembly of the International Space Station.

STS-87 Columbia was Scott's longest mission and the fourth U.S. Microgravity Payload flight. They launched November 19, 1997, and conducted several experiments such as the effects of zero gravity on physical functions of the human body. He performed two more spacewalks on this mission which included manually capturing the Spartan satellite and testing EVA tools and procedures.

In addition to being a naval aviator and an astronaut, Winston Scott is a musician and has a second-degree black belt in Shotokan karate. He graduated from Florida State University in 1972 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Music and also has a Master of Science Degree in Aeronautical Engineering. In July 2005, Scott published the book, "Reflections From Earth Orbit." Scott currently resides in Melbourne, Florida and is the Senior Vice President for External Relations and Economic Development at Florida Institute of Technology (FIT). He plays the trumpet for the Winston Scott Cosmic Jazz Ensemble, and directs a faculty band at FIT which they call "TWITCHY" after the initials of each band member.

Certificate of Appreciation for Supporting Veteran Children at Holiday Party at VMC



On December 08, 2023, a new 21,000 square-foot multi-mission facility was unveiled. The new building was constructed to support Coast Guard personnel and the missions of MSU and Station Port Canaveral. This represents the Coast Guard's commitment to support Port Canaveral's exponential growth.

The state-of-the-art facility provides improved operational capabilities and better protection from heavy weather events and consists of berthing rooms for overnight duty crews, a dining facility, training rooms, workshops, a boat bay, and a fitness room. MSU Port Canaveral has a crew of 29 active duty, reserve and civilian personnel who carry out port security, marine safety, search and rescue, and waterways management missions, along with environmental response and disaster assistance operations.

The unit's area of responsibility spans 857 miles of navigable

waterways throughout central Florida and its east coast.

Station Port Canaveral is comprised of 45 active duty and 30 reserve men and women. The station's core missions include search and rescue, maritime law enforcement, recreational boating safety, ports, waterways, and coastal security. Their area of responsibility spans 57 miles offshore including north of Haulover Canal, south to Malabar, the Indian River, and Banana River.

On Wreaths Across America (WAA) Day, 16 December, more volunteers, families and members of the public attended Ceremonies and Wreath Laying events in Brevard County than ever before.

The Cape Canaveral National Cemetery (CCNC) led the way and reported:

The WAA at CCNC conducted 14 ceremonies. At 1000 hours simultaneous ceremonies were held at all 14 sections in CCNC where more than 12,000 veterans and spouses have been laid to rest.

The FHP and CCNC confirmed more than 650 vehicles with at least 1800 people attended the solemn event.

Nationwide, 4104 WAA Locations were scheduled to hold ceremonies and wreath laying events. WAA set a record this year as generous citizens had purchased over 4 million remembrance wreaths by the 28 November deadline.

CCNC Director Ed Lyons and several on his staff volunteered their time to support the WAA/CCNC project led by Bette Nelson and a great team of Section leaders and almost 150 volunteers, to include parking, logistics and security which resulted in smooth and safe event.

Almost everyone who attended, reported that it was meaningful and well organized.

Perhaps one family said it best: "There was so much love and respect for veterans here today that we did wreaths for our friends and helped with many others. In fact, our family members are buried at another VA cemetery. They cancelled, you did not. Thank you."

The same day other Brevard WAA locations, covering about 40 private cemeteries

including the first official Brevard Veterans Cemetery in Titusville, held ceremonies and placed wreaths honoring veterans by name.

It may just have been Divine intervention, that heavy rains held off until just after 1 pm, when the ceremonies in most Brevard locations were completed. A final WAA ceremony was held on Sunday at 3 pm at the Pinecrest Cemetery in Cocoa. That is the final resting place of Korean War veteran and Medal of Honor Recipient, Edward Bennett, a Brevard native and namesake for the Bennett Causeway.

BATTLEFIELD COMMUNICATIONS

Never in the history of mankind has total battlefield action been observed by the public in real-time. The Israeli conflict in Gaza is televised day and night. The war in Ukraine is shown around the world. Every move is documented by video. News correspondents are embedded with the soldiers in full view of their camera crews. We see combatants firing everything from rifles

to rockets. We see the explosions and the rubble. Nothing is left to the imagination of the viewer. Nothing is left unseen.

Reporters have covered conflicts for millennia. Centuries ago they were most likely historians. We know war correspondents have covered battles Americans have fought in. We've seen photographs from the Civil War. But we've never experienced anything similar to what this new technology is bringing us.

What would have happened if the internet, telephones and telegraphs existed in 1814? The Battle of New Orleans was fought between the British Army and the United States roughly five miles southeast of the French Quarter of New Orleans on January 8, 1815. British Secretary of State and War, Henry Bathurst, issued secret orders to General Pakenham on October 24, 1814, commanding him to continue the war even if he heard rumors of peace.

The battle took place fifteen days after the signing of the Treaty of Ghent which formally ended the War of 1812 on December 24, 1814, but news of the agreement had not yet reached the United States from Europe. The British possessed a large advantage in numbers, training, and experience. The American forces defeated the British Army in slightly more than thirty minutes. Americans suffered just seventy-one casualties while the British suffered more than 2,000 including the deaths of Major General Sir Edward Pakenham and his second in command Major General Samuel Gibbs.

The Battle of New Orleans would never have been fought if news of the signing had been communicated instantaneously to both armies in real time. The technology of today would have saved the lives of soldiers who would have already been headed home by January 8, 1815. History would have undoubtedly been changed. Would the hero of the battle, Andrew Jackson, be elected as the seventh President of the United States?



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

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


Florida Tech ROTC Commissions five new Army Lieutenants






