FY2025 Budget Progress

Leading up to their annual Independence Day recess, and in spite of the gnashing of teeth within the Democratic Party following President Biden's dismal debate performance, Congress has been inching forward on the FY 2025 fiscal budget process. Appropriation committees in the Democratic-controlled Senate and the Republican-controlled House have been feverishly working to get to the goal line of passing the 12 annual spending bills that fund the US Government beginning 1 October 2024. Their efforts are complicated by last year's two-year budget plan agreement between President Biden and House Republicans which limits any increases to both defense and non-defense spending to just 1%. There is also the threat of an automatic 1% cut in spending from FY2023 levels that will occur if Congress does not agree to the full-year spending bills by 1 January 2025. It seems that many Members want to avoid this penalty while at the same time generating a work-around the 1% cap on increased spending given how badly DoD is underfunded.

In the Senate, a bi-partisan approach seems to be yielding dividends toward these goals even though significant divisions remain between the two sides. Three of the 12 annual funding measures for the departments of Agriculture and Veterans Affairs, and the legislative branch were approved in Committee in unanimous, 27-0 votes, which included Senator Rubio (R-FL). However, the Senate could not come to a bipartisan agreement on how much money to allocate for the remaining nine funding measures. On the matter of overcoming the 1% spending increase limit, the Senate Appropriations Committee made a deal to increase funding for both defense and nondefense agencies which would leverage "emergency" funding to boost non-defense agencies by a total of \$13.5 billion in extra spending, and the Pentagon by an extra \$21 billion. This deal would avoid furloughs and layoffs at many agencies across the government. As discussions continue on the remaining nine bills, how the emergency funding would be specifically allocated would depend on the final allocations across all twelve measures. In the House, partisanship reigns and the House has generally ignored parts of the deal they struck with President Biden last year to allow for the small increases as their bills would instead force average cuts of 6% at non-defense agencies. Even though the House has already approved some of its fiscal 2025 measures on the floor, President Biden has threatened to veto them over the cuts they contain. Notably, the legislative branch bill failed on the House floor. As the minority, House Democrats have overwhelmingly opposed each of the Republican bills. Whether or not ultimate success is achieved in passing these Appropriations bills in the near-term, Congress could opt to punt the drafting of bicameral funding bills until after the upcoming presidential election, as it did in 2020. This would be an unfortunate development.

Meanwhile, work is being finalized on the FY2025 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) with its two versions. The Senate text was released July 8, while the House version cleared that chamber in mid-June on a 217-199 vote. The current Senate version does not include many of the quality-of-life

improvements proposed in the House text, but opportunities remain to ensure these measures and others find a place in the final bill. Specifically, in Pay and Allowances, both plans would authorize a 4.5% pay raise for all ranks, but the Senate version adds only a 1% increase for those in grades E-1 to E-3, while the House plan would raise E-1 to E-4 pay an additional 15%, along with a smaller boost for E-5s. The Senate version does not include a mechanism to restore the Basic Allowance for Housing to 100%, while the House bill would cover the coming fiscal year but not subsequent years. In Health Care, the Senate bill does not include a House provision creating a pilot program to expand TRICARE Qualifying Life Events to include pregnancy. It also lacks the text of the Dental Care for Our Troops Act, included in the House NDAA that would extend zero-premium dental coverage to Guard and Reserve members. Finally, in Career Support and Military Spouse Employment, the Senate bill lacks a provision in the House bill that would remove the so-called "180-day rule," which requires transitioning servicemembers seeking civilian DoD positions to wait six months. The Senate NDAA does not include the text of the READINESS Act, which improves career flexibility for military spouses employed by the federal government who may lose their position due to a PCS move. One thing in the Senate version that the House is missing is a provision to clarify a recent change to the Servicemembers Civil Relief Act intended to improve the portability of professional licenses for military spouses who PCS across state lines. Additionally, the Senate bill would permanently authorize the noncompetitive hiring authority of military spouses by federal agencies. Stay tuned.

SURVIVOR ASSISTANCE LESSONS LEARNED

The Survivor Assistance Committee periodically combine our efforts and goals with the Financial Literacy Committee's goals and efforts to assist the membership of the MOAACC. We did this starting with June, then July, and now the August Intercom editions. The Financial Literacy Committee has provided an excellent article addressing the question "Who Will Make your Medical Decisions?" The SAT Lessons Learned reflects some of my own Family's personal experiences answering the question...

My Dad's lungs were failing (at age 86) from the work he did before he retired. My Mother had passed away 3 years earlier. Dad had an attorney whom he had depended on for at least the last 20 years for business and family. I was appointed his executor and my younger brother and I split everything 50-50 for everything in the Will.

Dad had a DNR (Do Not Resuscitate) and I had his Medical Power of attorney and his of attorney. All of it was subject to his not being incapacitated (i.e. he could no longer give informed consent, however he could revoke the DNR verbally).

I got the call that Dad was in the Memphis VA Hospital due to his lungs, both had failed. My brother and I both got there and the Doctor had him sedated and on a ventilator. I was confused!! Why didn't the Doctor follow the DNR instructions? The Doctor told me Dad could not breathe on his own and was terrified that he was dying (which he was) so he revoked the DNR and put him on the Ventilator (which called for being sedated). So now we didn't know what the next move was... we needed to talk, and as we walked past the bed in the next room, we saw a Vet on a Ventilator and it looked the same situation as Dad. The Doctor said the Vet had been on the Ventilator for over year... Why???? he told us the Vet's family could not agree what to do with him and only came by periodically.

When we came back, I asked the Doctor if he thought Dad might be able to use a Cannula for oxygen rather than the Ventilator which I thought Dad might tolerate since the Ventilator required sedation and was not mobile like carrying an O2 cylinder for the Cannula. The Doctor agreed on the test, so he put him on the Cannula but kept the sedation in case he awakened and panicked. However, He lasted only 22 hours and then passed away. That also allowed us some time to sit with him to say our goodbyes, that proved the right thing to do for us.

A Health care surrogate's responsibility can be demanding, I know!! We all hope that Vet is not still on the Ventilator

Who Will Make Your Medical Decisions?

Illness, accident, or advanced age can render a person incapable of making medical decisions for him/herself. When a person becomes incapacitated and is no longer able to give informed consent, health care providers must look to someone else to make medical decisions for that person. In Florida, the law provides for two options: a health care surrogate or a health care proxy. A health care surrogate is a person named in advance to make the health care decisions for the person in a document named, Designation of Health Care Surrogate. A health care proxy is a person who volunteers to make medical decisions for the incapacitated person.

A Health Care Surrogate grants a person you choose the power to make important medical decisions for you, if you become incapacitated. However, you must sign the Designation of Health Care Surrogate document before you become incapacitated. Once incapacitated a person cannot grant that power any longer. Incapacity occurs when a physician designates that the person can longer give informed consent. Once that occurs, the health care surrogate takes over making the medical decisions for the incapacitated person.

But what happens if there is no Designation of Health Care Surrogate? A volunteer under the Florida Health Care Proxy statute is the only option. That statute provides a priority of persons to make decisions on behalf of the incapacitated individual, as follows:

- (a) Judicially appointed guardian of the person;
- (b) Patient's spouse;
- (c) Adult child of the patient, or, if more than one, a majority of the adult children;
- (d) Adult sibling of the patient, or, if more than one, a majority of the adult siblings;
- (e) Adult relative who has shown special care and concern and maintained regular contact;
- (f) Close friend of the patient;
- (g) Social worker selected by bioethics committee of the health care provider.

Your health care decision maker must use "substituted judgment". "Substituted judgment" means if they know your desires, then they must follow them. When you complete the Designation of Health Care Surrogate, you should also inform the surrogate what your future medical wishes may be or you could complete a Health Care Workbook which some attorneys will provide with your documents. If your wishes are unknown, the decision maker must do what is in the "best interests" of the patient.

The bottom line here is that you are free to designate whomever you want as your health care (decision maker) surrogate. Absent a Designation of Health Care Surrogate, the Health Care Proxy statute could nominate a health care decision maker for you, but they must volunteer. Keep in mind, however, that this volunteer might not be the person that you want making your health care decisions nor the best person to make your medical decisions. To ensure that your wishes are carried out, it is best to a complete a Designation of Health Care Surrogate naming at least a primary and alternate surrogate.

POINTS TO PONDER

How is your Balance?

What is balance – It means Physical Equilibrium. As we move through life, we realize that equilibrium is somehow not what is used to be. For example, to put socks on your feet you are having to sit down for fear of losing your balance. If you lose your balance, you can:

- 1. Break a leg (hip being the most common in older generation)
- 2. Break your wrist and or arm
- 3. Hit your head and get a concussion

Falls can be prevented by improving your balance. Let me present five basic balance exercises to you that you can do totally on your own without the need for any special equipment. A word of caution: please stand close to a wall or a counter when attempting these exercises.



Step-Stand-Balance-Warrior I

Stand with your hands on your sides, take a step back on your toes and raise both hands up. Hold for 3 sec then repeat on opposite side. Do 5-10 repetitions



Step-Stand-Balance-Warrior II

Stand with your hands on your sides, take a large step back and plant your foot. Raise arms to your side and turn your trunk while looking forward. Hold for 3 sec then repeat on opposite side. Do 5-10 repetitions



Step-Stand-Balance-Warrior III

Stand with your hands on your sides. Reach forward with both arms and lift one leg up behind you. Hold for 3 sec then repeat on opposite side. Do 5-10 repetitions



Single leg Balance with Ball Pass

Stand and balance on one leg holding a small ball. Maintain your balance and pass ball from side to side for 3 seconds then switch to the other side. Repeat 5-10 times each



Dead Lift Reach (Dynamic Balance)

Start by standing on one leg. Gradually lean forward to touch an object the height of which you are comfortable with. Switch from one side to the other 5-10 times.





At Merritt Island Independence Day Parade, a WWII Vet was a Hit

July 4 saw many great events in Brevard County this year. The sixth annual Merritt Island Independence Day Parade had some surprises. The event was sponsored by Brevard County Sheriff Office Charities in coordination with the Veterans Memorial Center (VMC). It included the largest number of BCSO vehicles and fire trucks yet, as well as more than 20 veteran and military related entries.

It likely was the hottest July morning since the tradition began and did not see as many viewers as last year, but still, a well over 2000 people, including hundreds of children and young families lined the 1.2-mile route. The parade ran from Merritt Island High School south on Courtney Pkwy to Edgewood Jr/Sr High School on Merritt Ave. It was filmed and can be viewed on Space Coast Daily Friday Night Lights TV link. Several other media outlets also covered the event.

The Naval Ordnance Test Unit (NOTU) at Port Canaveral made a big splash with their Color Guard and mini-submarine. The VMC truck with Liberty Eagle, driven by VMC Pres Dean Schaaf and his wife Susan, led the way for veteran groups, including the Cape Canaveral Chapter of the Military Officers Association of America (MOAACC), the Marine Corps League, several American Legion Floats and others. It being election season, the parade ended with more than a dozen politically focused vehicles and marchers. Plenty of candy and mini flags were handed out to happy kids and families.

The MOAACC Convertible, with Pres Rick Kniseley and 1VP Steve Cusick; included a very special passenger - 98-year-old WWII and Korean War Army Combat Veteran George Rosenfield. Along the route dozens of parade watchers and kids were invited to come to shake his hand and all said, "Thank you for your service". Mr. Rosenfield was all smiles, especially after Sheriff Wayne Ivey hugged him and presented a special BCSO pin to honor him as the parade concluded.

The Parade, along with other big events in Melbourne, Palm Bay and more locations, was clearly a great example of a special Americana type tradition. Seeing hundreds of youngsters who will become adult citizens in the future, made the time spent planning, decorating, and facing the heat challenge, well worthwhile. We are looking forward to the 250th Celebration of America in 2026 to be remembered for years to come!!

The Role of Aircraft in WWI (Part 7)

THE NEW BREED. A new breed of pilot, the fighter pilot, emerged with a singular mission-to gain control of the sky. Each flight was a tale of bravery, each record a testament to their unwavering dedication. They were the modern-day knights of the Great War, embodying not just the audacity of their feats, but the nobility of their spirit.

The advent of aerial combat revolutionized warfare tactics. For centuries, armies and navies had sought victory with direct, surface-based campaigns. However, with the introduction of powered flight, military leaders began to grasp the potential of taking the battle to the sky. With their unique vantage point, airmen could provide crucial information for command decisions, expanding the battlefield to the sky and striking deep into enemy lines.

EDDIE RICKENBACKER. Lifelong daredevil Eddie Rickenbacker entered World War I as one of the United States' top racecar drivers, having competed in the first Indianapolis 500 and set land speed records at Daytona





Speedway. After a stint as a chauffeur on General John J. Pershing's staff, he talked his way into the newly formed United States Army Air Service. He earned his wings in early 1918. His working-class background and advanced age of twenty-seven alienated him from his genteel squadron mates. He was two years older than the pilots' age limit; however, Rickenbacker proved to be a natural in the cockpit. He was known for inching perilously close to his quarry before firing his guns, and often took seemingly suicidal risks in combat. He won the Medal of Honor for one September 1918 incident in which he singlehandedly engaged a flight of seven German aircraft and managed to bag two before making a miraculous getaway.

Rickenbacker ended the war as America's "ace of aces" with a total of 26 victories to his name, eighteen of which came in a span of 48 days. He continued to cheat death in his later years by surviving a pair of horrific plane crashes in 1941 and 1942, the second of which left him adrift in the
