LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS

The Speaker of the House

Despite facing a shrinking majority and internal opposition from some members of his own party, Speaker of the House Mike Johnson (R-LA) seems to be excelling in his role as a leader after less than six months on the job.

Apart from successfully passing the remainder of the FY2024 budget in the House prior to the looming 22 March deadline, thereby avoiding another debilitating government shutdown, the Speaker has accomplished several commendable victories on various contentious bills that carry substantial national security implications. It is worth mentioning that Congressman Posey and Senator Rubio both voted against the \$1.2 Trillion bill, while Senator Scott chose not to participate in the voting process.

A factor contributing to Johnson's achievements is his recent meeting with former President Trump during which Trump praised him for his effective work despite resistance from fellow lawmakers. Representative Greene (R-GA) had previously sought to oust Johnson from the Speaker's role. Evidently, the Speaker demonstrates a deep understanding of contemporary politics and a talent for utilizing it to accomplish tasks.

The House passed a two-year reauthorization of Section 702 of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) on April 12th, preventing the provision from expiring on April 19th. This law enables the government to collect data from foreign individuals through U.S. companies such as AT&T and Google, for intelligence and counterterrorism purposes without a warrant even if they are communicating with Americans. Speaker Johnson compromised on a shorter two-year extension instead of the initially proposed five years. The final vote was split, with 273 in favor and 147 against, with support from both Republicans and Democrats. Congressman Posey once again opposing.


The House reviewed a series of proposed changes, one of which was a suggestion to prohibit officials from using Americans' identifiers (such as email addresses) to search messages without first obtaining warrants. Unfortunately, this proposal was defeated in a tied vote of 212 to 212, with Mr. Johnson breaking the tie with a decisive "no" vote. The amendment caused a division between the two parties, with 126 Democrats and 86 Republicans voting against it, while 128 Republicans and 84 Democrats voted in favor.

Despite causing discontent among many members of his party, Speaker Johnson occasionally relies on his Democratic counterparts to accomplish the tasks. However, the House did approve several significant modifications to the bill, including allowing the Section 702 program to gather intelligence on foreign narcotics trafficking organizations and screen potential foreign visitors to the United States. Furthermore,

they grant congressional leaders the opportunity to observe classified hearings before the national security surveillance court and expanding the types of companies required to participate in the program.

On other pressing matters, Speaker Johnson has been considering how to address the \$95 billion emergency national security spending package for Ukraine and Israel passed by the Senate in February—how to cobble together a coalition of mainstream Republicans and Democrats who will support the bill. Two options are under consideration; structuring the aid as a loan, an idea Mr. Johnson has publicly floated and that former President Trump previously endorsed. Another is to move it through the House in tandem with a second bill containing policies endorsed by the conservative wing of his party, a separate package geared toward mollifying G.O.P. critics. The Speaker is also running into growing opposition from Democrats concerned the soaring civilian death toll and humanitarian catastrophe unfolding in Gaza as well as the strike by the Israeli military that killed seven aid workers in Gaza. These actions will truly test the Speaker.

Meanwhile, this is the week (15-19 April) of the annual MOAA campaign to execute its "Advocacy in Action" lobbying efforts. Our own Steve Bond will participate in person and has been assigned to meet with all three of our key members in Congress and the Senate: Senators Rubio and Scott and Congressman Posey. We will get the full-blown account of how those meetings and the rest of the campaign unfolded directly from Steve in next month's edition of the INTERCOM. Stay tuned.





FINANCIAL LITERACY

Adult Children and Family Finances

At what age should a couple tell their child about family finances? At what age is it appropriate to let the child know about the family's assets, documents, etc?

There is no definitive answer. Like so many questions about finance, the answer is probably "it depends." The answer could be when the child is in his 20's (when he has gained some financial maturity himself), or in his 50's (as you the parent get older and maybe need assistance), or never (if it's uncomfortable or you desire privacy). Obviously, the decision is purely yours.

Curious on what people think, I did some research. Some common remarks:

"What would be the purpose of letting the child know about your finances? What is it that you intend to accomplish?"

"I doubt we'll tell our kids details about our finances until there is a good reason to. What can be gained from your kids knowing what they do not need to?"

One other common remark: "Let them know before they need to take over."

In my opinion, one wise course of action is it's less important to tell him about exact dollar balances of assets, but it's critical that he knows exactly what's going to happen if something happens to both you and your spouse, and where to find whatever he needs (documents, etc.) Hopefully, one's estate plans have been fully addressed, and you have all of the important documents that COL John Murphy in this Financial Literacy forum so fervently advises.

You don't necessarily need to tell the adult child the exact numbers of your assets, but just casually mentioning that you're planning for retirement and are set can help him to plan for his own future/estate planning and might mean he comes to you for financial advice in the future.

This entire topic is directly related to the Survivors Assistance Team (SAT) and their monthly articles on Survivor Assistance Lessons Learned. But just to touch just the surface on the topic:

Every family is undoubtedly different. But two great steps are to create and maintain the "in case of emergency" notebook (whether it's a physical folder stuffed with paper, and/or in electronic form as groups of files) and, very importantly, share where this important folder is located. Some candidate contents are: a list of contacts (family accountant; the lawyer who prepared your wills/trust; fee-only financial planner); your wills; durable powers of attorney; a list of all your financial accounts, including a printout from each financial institution; pension details; insurance policies; and in this modern world, a list of user names/passwords for pertinent digital accounts.



SURVIVOR ASSISTANCE LESSONS LEARNED

A few years ago, I attended a "Virtual TMBC" (using Zoom) followed by a presentation and presented by Capt Robin Peterson and LtCol Roger Klaffka on "Contingency Estate Planning for Uncertain Times." I learned a LOT! I have always stressed in these Survivor Assistance Lessons Learned articles, the importance of making preparations for losing a spouse long before anything happens. These gentlemen addressed the question "what can go wrong with our preparation planning", and do our preparations include dealing with things going wrong?

An example is if both you and your spouse pass away, and so does your Beneficiary (i.e., a car crash that takes the lives of all three of you), do you have a "contingency Beneficiary" named. Do you even have Beneficiaries (and backup Beneficiaries) named for all your financial accounts of ALL types, and life insurances? Do these Beneficiaries know what the responsibilities (and liabilities) of being a Beneficiary are?

Did you know there are four main ways to pass on assets, and each has pros and cons that need to be evaluated in light of your needs. And each have ways to plan for contingencies in your plans...

Do you realize the importance of having "Power of Attorney" set up for different situations? Like for finances, and for health care, and the different aspects of those situations?

It is good to at least be aware of these options so you can make an informed decision about them!

The Financial Literacy Committee and the Survival Assistance Team are going to team up together for a couple of articles in the near future in the Intercom since both have the goal of dealing that MOAACC members have a good future!!!! Don't miss it!!!!!

Everyone needs physical activity to stay healthy. But it can be hard to find the time in your busy routine. No matter who you are, you can find safe, fun ways to get active — to move your way.

Kids and Teens

Ages 6 to 17 should aim for 60 minutes of activity every single day, including a variety of activities that strengthen bones, build muscles, and make your heart beat faster!

Adults

All adults should strive for at least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity activity per week and do muscle-strengthening activities on at least 2 days per-week.

• Older Adults

Older adults have similar recommendations to younger adults, including 150 minutes of moderate-intensity activity per-week and do muscle-strengthening activities on at least 2 days per week. In addition, older adults should incorporate activities that focus on improving balance each week.

POINTS TO PONDER

I Pledge Allegiance



MOAACC members faithfully recite the Pledge of Allegiance at functions where our Nation's flag is displayed, presented, or posted. But do we appreciate the origins of those hallowed

words? It was U.S. Army Captain George Balch who in 1887 proposed the wording: "We give our heads and hearts to God and our country; one country, one language, one flag!" Balch nationally promoted teaching children loyalty to country, distributing flags to every school.

Rev. Francis Bellamy published a significant revision in the late 1800's for the national public-school celebration on the 400th anniversary of Columbus's arrival: "I pledge allegiance to my Flag and the Republic for which it stands, one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

In 1906, the DAR blended the wording: "I pledge allegiance to my flag, and the republic for which it stands. I pledge my head and my heart to God and my country. One country, one language and one flag." In 1923 the National Flag Conference changed "my Flag" to "the Flag of the United States" then added the words "of America." In the thick of WWII, Congress affirmed: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

That sounds very familiar, but what is missing? Another chaplain brought the pledge to its fullness. Louis Albert Bowman was Chaplain of the Illinois Society of the SAR. He recited the pledge including "under God" from Lincoln's Gettysburg Address: "That the nation shall, under God, have a new birth of freedom."

During the Cold War, many Americans wanted to distinguish the U.S. from the state atheism of communist countries. Through the 40's and 50's, The Knights of Columbus (Catholic), Rep. Louis Rabaut (D-Mich.), Rev. George MacPherson Docherty (Protestant), and Rep. Charles Oakman (R-Mich.) promoted the essentiality of Americans recognizing our God in our pledge.

The message was heard in Congress which passed legislation signed by President Eisenhower on Flag Day, 1954 with these words: "Millions of our school children will daily proclaim in every city and town, every village and rural schoolhouse, the dedication of our nation and our people to the Almighty...In this way we are reaffirming the transcendence of religious faith in America's heritage and future; in this way we shall constantly strengthen those spiritual weapons which forever will be our country's most powerful resource, in peace or in war."

Advocacy in Action—2024

On April 17th, MOAA's annual signature legislative event-Advocacy in Action or AiA--occurred on Capitol Hill. Team Florida was out in front to meet with our twentynine elected Congressional Representatives or their staffers in their Washington offices. The five Florida Teams were led by Florida Council Vice President, Steve Bond, John Murphy incoming Council Vice President, Pierre Louis—Council Legislative Affairs Chair, Tony LaVecchia—NE Florida Area Vice President, Dan Hill-Mid-Central Florida Area Vice President, and ably assisted by MOAA Board Members--Marc Oliveri, Rick Buchanan, and Mike Hewitt, and MOAA Virtual Chapter Representatives--Joe Gollasch and Stephanie Rose. Team Florida represented our thirty-eight chapters and all 38,000 MOAA Members in Florida. Our mission was to advocate for all veterans and their families to ensure the promises made to veterans are kept and to highlight MOAA's strength in numbers.

Advocacy in Action started well before our

There were "Calls to Action" where MOAA's 363,000 members were asked to TAKE ACTION by sending email messages or by calling their representatives to voice support for the issues. Proudly, Florida sent the most email messages through MOAA's Legislative Action Center. There were over 1,700 messages from Florida alone of a total nationally of 6,750.

Lt Gen Brian Kelly (USAF, Ret), MOAA President and CEO commented after the event--"It is days like today that show the strength of what MOAA can do... The power of this organization is our ability to marshal our members to speak with one voice."

It was exciting to be part of the AiA efforts on Capitol Hill and see the firsthand results of our collective advocacy efforts. I was proud to be a MOAA member, making a difference and protecting the earned benefits for all veterans and their families! However, our work is not done. all cadets will be able to practice flying private aircraft, airliners many types of military aircraft and even helicopters.



THE ROLE OF AIRCRAFT IN WWI (Part 4)

L27 German Zeppelin

At the start of World War I the German armed forces had ten zeppelins and three smaller airships. This impressive offensive capability was offset by the highly explosive nature of the hydrogen gas that gave the zeppelins their lifting power. After losing three zeppelins in daylight raids over heavily defended areas in the first month of the war, the German army abandoned airship operations. However, the German Navy, its battle fleet blockaded in port by the British Royal Navy, mounted a night bombing offensive which became the first aerial strategic bombardment campaign in history.

The most formidable zeppelin was the LZ-70 Schwaben, which was a floating rigid airship that was 720 feet long and able to fly higher than 16,000 feet with a range of 7,500 miles. There were about 21 zeppelins in circulation at the start of World War I, 14 of which were operated by the German military. The LZ-70

was shot down late in the war, however, and large rigid (metal-framed) airships were never again employed as combat aircraft.

Smaller, nonrigid airships were used throughout World War I by the British for antisubmarine patrol, convoy escort, and coastal reconnaissance, achieving a remarkable record of protecting coastal convoys from German submarines. They were revived by the U.S. Navy during World War II for the same use.

World War I is remembered for its dreadful combination of technological ingenuity and strategic indecisiveness. The growth of army sizes, and the introduction of new weapons like long-range heavy artillery and chemical gas, turned combat into mechanized carnage on an unprecedented scale. It also made it more essential than ever for armies to gather information about enemy troops and weapons. Stationary balloons were used for observation and artillery spotting as early as the American Civil War. Use of balloons was widespread during World War I.

Unpowered, captive balloons also were used extensively for observation and artillery spotting in World War I. They had become so vulnerable that they were used only as unmanned antiaircraft barrage balloons by World War II. Anchored to the ground or ships by cables, they compelled attacking enemy aircraft to fly high to avoid the cables. (Next month: The Lafayette Escadrille: Part 1)






